## President's Diary Sept. 2021

Science is supposed to be a domain of human activity that transcends cultural biases, religious leanings or political preferences. To undertake unbiased enquiry the nature of physical unencumbered by any value-system is the core principle that all scientists are expected to adhere to. Thus, science by default is a universal endeavor in search of truth and a common heritage of all mankind. It has the potential to bring together disparate social groups across the world under the umbrella of a single scientific fraternity. Science is, therefore, rightly considered as a force for unity of mankind and a means of creating bridges among nations. Numerous examples can be given where 'science diplomacy' has brought about reconciliation, understanding and cooperation in the face of strongly conflicting political ideologies. Unfortunately, many examples can also be given where political agendas continue to undermine scientific ethos.

In Pakistan, we have firsthand experience of how a belligerent and hostile neighbor, with leadership blatantly following an obscurantist Hindutva philosophy, is blocking the progress of an entire subcontinent, in spite of good personal repertoire and mutual respect among their scientific elites. One has only to sit in a colloquium in Abdus Salam International Centre for Theoretical Physics (AS-ICTP) at Trieste, Italy, to find the bon homie among Pakistani and Indian scientists. After all if you are engaged in a quest to understand the ultimate nature of matter or the large scale structure of universe than regional rivalries on a speck of dust in the vast cosmos make little sense to be obsessed with. The noble task of increasing mankind's common stock



of knowledge is, however, severely hampered by vile propaganda spitted out from hundreds of fake media channels and websites set up by India, as revealed by EU Dis Info Lab, in its fifteen-year long study

entitled "Indian Chronicles". The object of this hybrid war is none other than discrediting and destabilizing Pakistan and diverting attention of the world from brutalities being committed by Indian security forces in held Kashmir.
